



Baptisms:

Make arrangements with the pastor. Copy of Birth Certificate must be submitted, at the latest, one week before the baptism.

Marriages:

Make arrangements with the pastor 6-8 months in advance. Must be a registered parishioner at least six months prior to beginning marriage prep. Cohabiting couples will normally be required to separate before scheduling a wedding.



From Fr. Glen's This is the 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time. Our readings for this Sunday praise the faith of our ancestors and call us to be strong and ready in faith for the Master's return. Jesus also tells us to be ready for His return in the parables of the bridegroom's delayed return and of the servants awaiting their master's return.

In both cases, Jesus uses the example of an awaited one being long in coming back. This makes it clear that, though early Christians like St. Paul expected Jesus to return very shortly, this would not be the case. Each generation is given the challenge to remain alive and active in faith until His return. Currently, as a community of believers, we are not doing so well at remaining awake and waiting for Him.

This is a wake-up call for us to shake off the half-heartedness and indifference that has dulled the life of the Church in recent decades. The causes of this are many, as our social culture is quite toxic to faith and religion. This does not excuse us from making our best effort to stir our faith anew and to try to help others to do so!

As summer draws to its close, in whatever bits of time that you have to spare, ask these questions during a time of prayer: Lord, is my faith as strong as you want it to be? How can I help others to come to a strong faith? If we are baptized, we are God's children by adoption. Any parent is deeply wounded by their kids' rejection. God is also deeply wounded by being rejected by so many of His own adopted kids. The devotion to the Sacred Heart is focused on this point particularly and offers condolence to His wounded heart that aches as so many of His adopted kids reject Him. Eucharistic adoration is another way to offer condolences to the wounded heart of Jesus on behalf of the many who ignore or reject Him. It also deepens our own faith greatly. Have you ever invited someone who doesn't adore to come along with you to the adoration chapel? May Our Lady help us to make sweet condolences to the heart of her crucified Son.

St. Thomas's Turkey dinner festival is coming up next Sunday, August 17th,following 10:30 Mass until 4:00PM. Mark your calendar and come to engage in a moment of sweet Catholic culture! (By the way, the turkey and dressing are on a whole other plane of goodness! I needn't mention the refrigerator pickles as I have carried on about their exquisite wonderfulness before.)






OUR CATHOLIC FAITH

AUGUST - MONTH OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

The month of August is traditionally dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in the Catholic Church. This devotion encourages reflection on Mary's virtues, love, and her role as the Mother of God.



- Marian Feasts: August features several significant Marian feast days - the Dedication of the Basilica of St. Mary Major on August 5th, the Assumption of Mary on August 15th, and the Queenship of Mary on August 22nd.
- Assumption of Mary: This feast commemorates
 the belief that Mary was taken body and soul into
 heaven, highlighting her unique place in the Church
 and her role as the Mother of God.
- Traditional Devotion: The dedication of August to the Immaculate Heart of Mary is a tradition rooted in popular piety and devotion, where each month is linked to a particular saint or sacred event. This tradition began in the 16th century, according to Catholic Culture.
- Historical Context: The devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary gained prominence, particularly after World War II, with Pope Pius XII's emphasis on the message of <u>Fatima</u> and his dedication to Our Lady.
- <u>Practices</u>: Catholics often commemorate these Marian feasts through various acts of devotion, such as attending Mass, praying the rosary, making a holy hour, or engaging in other prayers and reflections dedicated to Mary.

HISTORICAL EVIDENCE FOR THE ASSUMPTION OF OUR HOLY MOTHER

Archaeology

Archaeology has revealed two tombs of Mary, one in Jerusalem and one in Ephesus. The fact that Mary lived in both places explains the two tombs. But what cannot be explained, except for the Assumption, is the fact that there is no body in either tomb.

Relics

There are no relics. Early Church history shows that Christian belief in the communion of saints and the sanctity of the body led early Christians to seek out with the



greatest fervor relics from the bodies of great saints. Cities, and, later, religious orders, would fight over the bones of great saints.

This is one reason why we have relics of the apostles and so many of the greatest saints and martyrs in history. We even have the bones of Mary's mother, Anne. Yet never was there a single relic of Mary's body? As revered as Mary was, this would be very strange, except for the fact of the assumption of her body.

Manuscripts

Whole families of manuscripts from different areas of the world in the sixth century told similar stories of Mary's Assumption, which meant there had to be previous manuscripts from which everyone received their data. As research progressed, earlier manuscripts were found. The most recent - Syriac fragments of stories about the Assumption of Mary have been dated as early as the third century.

It must be remembered that when we are talking about these manuscripts, we are not only talking about ancient manuscripts and fragments of manuscripts, but we are talking also about different "families" of manuscripts written in nine languages. They all agree on Mary's Assumption and they presuppose that the story was already widely known.

We might ask why the earliest Church Fathers did not write about the Assumption. Because the Gnostics, who were some of the main enemies of the Faith in the early centuries of the Christian era, agreed with the Church on the matter, there was no need to defend the teaching. In other words, there is no record of anyone disagreeing on the matter. Just as we don't find works from the earliest Fathers on Jesus' celibacy either was most likely due to the universal agreement on the topic. Much of early Christian literature was on defending problem areas in the Church that needed to be addressed.

There has been disagreement as to whether Mary was taken up alive or after having died; but whether or not she was assumed was not a question. To this day, the Church has not decided definitively on whether Mary died or not.

DEVOTIONS, EXPLAINED!

House Blessing, Explained!

Catholics who move to a new place of residence often wish to have their dwelling blessed, to call the favor and help of God upon all those who live in the house and all those who will enter it.

The Roman Ritual (Book of Blessings) provides two formats for house blessings: one during the Easter or Christmas season (specifically for the Epiphany) and one for Ordinary Time. Those who live in the home must be present for a house to be blessed. A priest, deacon or lay person can administer the blessing, although if a lay person does so they must use the rites accorded to lay ministers in the Roman Ritual.

A house blessing includes Scripture readings, intercessions and a prayer of blessing.
